THE THE OLISHIGHT DEPARTM

The Charter of this Institution authorizes its Board of Directors to organize Colleges for Literature and Science, Law, Médicine, and a Normal School. The following Departments exhibit the course of study required for graduation in the colleges of Literature and Science, and Law. Additional departments will be organized, as the exigencies of the Institution may demand.

I.-THE ENGLISH AND NORMAL SCHOOL.

PROF. J. R. CHALLEN, A. M.

In this Department, the English Language and the Sciences which pertain to every day life, will receive the attention which their importance demands. The art of reading, speaking, and writing the language of our country must of necessity be one of the chief aims of a scholastic_course; hence every effort will be made to render familiar all the branches of an English education, the principal of which are Spelling, Reading, Penmanship, Mental and Written Arithmetic, Descriptive and Physical Geography, History, English Grammar, Composition, Elocution, Drawing, Bookkeeping, &c.

II .- THE MATHEMATICAL DEPARTMENT.

PROF. G. W. Hoss. A. M.

The studies required for graduation in this Department extend over four years, if combined with the labor of other schools; but may be completed in three years by those who take only a Mathematical and Scientific course. The studies in this department will be Algebra; Geometry; Trigonometry, Plane and Spherical; Surveying, Mensuration, Conic Sections, Analytical Geometry, Mechanics, Calculus, and Astronomy; also Civil Engineering, at the option of the student.

Special instruction will be secured to any who may pursue the study of Surveying with a practical object in view.

III.—THE CLASSICAL DEPARTMENT.

PROF. A. R. BENTON, A. M.

The books read in this Department embrace an extensive course of study in Latin and Greek.

The course will comprise the reading of the following authors, commencing with Bullion's series of Grammars and Readers : In Latin, Creaser's Commentaries, Sallust, Virgil, Cierco's Orations, Horace, Cieero de Amicitia, Tacitus, Cierco's Tusculan Disputations, Plautus. In Greek, Xenophon's Anabasis and Memorabilia, Herodotus, Homer's Iliad, Thucydides, Demosthenes, Sophocles, Greek and Roman Antiquities.

IV .- THE DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL SCIENCE.

PROF. JOHN YOUNG, A. M.

To this Department belong Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Physiology, Botany, Geology, and Mineralogy.

The means of instruction will be text-books, lectures, and experiments. The apparatus, with the aid of charts, is sufficiently complete to illustrate the sciences taught. The geological and mineralogical cabinet is extensive and well selected.

V .- THE LAW DEPARTMENT.

PROF. J. YOUNG, ATTORNEY AT LAW.

The examination for graduation in this Department requires the study of the following authors : Walker's American Law, Blackstone's Commentaries, Kent's Commentaries, Stephen on Pleading, Greenleaf on Evidence, Story's Equity Jurisprudence, and Cooper's Justinian Code. Students may graduate in Law whenever the showe course has been mastered.

VI.—THE DEPARTMENT OF ETHICS AND INTELLECTUAL SCIENCE.

To this Department belong the Evidences of Revealed Religion and its Analogy to Nature, Moral Philosophy and Natural Theology. For the present, Logic, Rhetoric, Intellectual Science, and Politi-

cal Economy will be taught in this Department.

The charter of the Institution requires the Bible to be taught as a class-book, but forbids the inculcation of sectarian or partisan dogmas; and to attain this end each student will be required to attend a Bible class every Monday morning.

FEMALE COLLEGIATE COURSE.

First Year.

FIRST TERM. Algebra, Cæsar, Geometry, Rhetoric. SECOND TERM. Algebra, Cicero—Oratious, Geometry, English Literature.

Second Year.

FIRST TERM. Trigonometry, Sallust, Natural Philosophy, Physiology. SECOND TERM. Virgil, Philosophy, Botany, Physiology.

Third Year.

FIRST TERM. German or French, Chemistry, Astronomy. SECOND TERM. German or French, Evidences of Christianity. Moral Philosophy, Geology.

Examinations.

There will be two examinations during the year; the one at the close of the first term, the other at the close of the collegiate year, at which all students are required to be present. Students who are candidates for graduation will be examined at the commencement of their graduation year upon the whole of their previous course of study, including the English Department. Candidates for advanced standing will be examined before admission to it.

Degrees.

The regular College Course will extend over four years, and on the satisfactory completion of it the degree of Bachelor of Arts will be conferred.

The Female Collegiate Course is designed to occupy three years, and when completed will entitle to the degree of Mistress of Science; and on the completion of the College Course, the degree of Mistress of Arts will be conferred.

Students who do not wish to undergo the labor of a full classical course will be permitted to graduate in the schools of Mathematics, Natural Science, Intellectual Science, and Ethics, and may receive the degree of Bachelor of Science, upon passing satisfactory examinations in these departments.

Galendar for 1858-'59.

The Collegiate Year is divided into two terms, of twenty weeks each. The first commences Wednesday, September 15, 1858; closes February 11, 1859. The second commences Monday, February 14, 1859; closes July 4, 1859. Commencement July 2, 1858. Christmas holiday, one week.

Address before the Mathesian Society, evening of June 30, 1858. Address before the Pythonian Society, evening of June 26, 1858.

Anniversary of the Pythonian Society, October 19, 1859. Anniversary of the Mathesian Society, May 5, 1859.

Literary Societies.

In connection with the Institution are two Literary Societies, the Mathesian and Pythonian, which are to be regarded as valuable auxiliaries to the Institution. Donations of books to either Society will be gratefully received.

Library.

The Institution is furnished with a small Library, to which it is hoped that large accessions will soon be made by purchase and donations from friends.

Gabinet and Apparatus.

The Cabinet of the Institution, the bequest of the late Dr. Van Tuyl, of Dayton, Ohio, is especially valuable.

The Institution also possesses a well selected Chemical and Philosophical Apparatus, as a nucleus for further acquisition. Donations to either will be gratefully received.

Building and Campus.

The University Building is situated one and a half miles northeast of the center of the city, in a Campus of twenty-five acres, covered with primitive forest trees. Its location secures the advantages of both city and country.

Boarding.

Boarding is easily obtained in good families, at rates from \$2 50 to \$3 00 per week.

Government.

The Faculty will aim, by mild but firm means, to secure the faithful discharge of duty from every student; and a register will be kept of the daily attendance and recitations of each student, for determining each one's progress and standing.

Religious Instruction.

Students are required to attend public worship once at least every Sabbath, and the Sabbath lectures in the University Hall.

Rhetorical Exercises.

Exercises in Declamation and Composition are required of every student.

Students are required to pay their tuition fees to the Treasurer, in advance, for each term, and will not otherwise be admitted to the Institution.

AN ORDINANCE

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

OF STUDENTS.

SEC. 19. Students of either sex, of good moral character and habits shall be entitled to admission into the University Every candidate for admission, as a student, must pay to the Treasurer of the Institution the tuition fees in advance, at least to the end of the current term, not being less than half a term. Each student, of the age of fourteen years or upwards, when he or she applies for admission as a student, shall procure and read a copy of the By-Laws pertaining to the duties of students, and shall then sign his or her name in a book to be kept for that purpose by the Secretary of the Faculty, stating his or her age and place of nativity, and the name of his or her parent or guardian, under a caption, in the following words: "Having carefully read the By-Laws pertaining to the duties of students of the Northwestern Christian University I do hereby subscribe myself student thereof, and I do hereby solemply promise that, during my connection with it, I will faithfully observe and obey its laws, rules, and regulations,"

SEC. 20. To remain a student in connection with the University, every student is required to observe the following regulations:

 Immediately after matriculation, the student shall select from the different schools, with the advice and consent of the Faculty, an amount of study equivalent to three daily recitations.

2. That the student be diligent in study, and punctual in his attendance upon recitations, examinations, and other College Exercises.

3. That having entered any college class, the student shall not leave it without the permission of the Faculty.

 That the student neither introduce nor use, upon the premises of the University, any intoxicating beverages.

5. That the student do not bring, or use upon said premises, any fire-arms, dirk, bowie-knife, or any other kind of deadly weapon.

6. That the student abstain from profanity, the desceration of the Lord's day, all kinds of gaming, even for amusements, and whatever is inconsistent with good order, good taste, or good morals.

7. That the student attend public worship at least once every Lord's day.

 That the student be strictly moral in language and conduct, respectful to the officers of the Institution, and courteous and kind to all the students of the University.

 That the student carefully observe all the rules and regulations contained in any part of this Ordinance, respecting fees, societies, and University grounds and buildings.

10. The marriage of any student, during the term times, shall, in the discretion of the Facalty, be regarded as sufficient reason for the disconnection of such student with the Institution during the balance of the term.

OF DISCIPLINE.

SEC. 22. The Discipline of the University is confided to the Faculty, under the provisions herein contained. As far as practicable, it shall be parental, and all severe and disgraceful punishments shall be avoided, and appeals addressed to the reason and conscience. But to maintain good order, and to secure the very important objects for which the Institution was founded, the Faculty may inflict, at their discretion, according to the character of the offense, any of the following penalties:

1. Private admonition.

2. Public admonition.

3. Suspension for a time at the discretion of the Faculty.

4. Expulsion.

No student shall be publicly suspended or expelled without an opportunity of being fully heard in his or her own defense; and in all cases of expulsion the party expelled may appeal to the Board

within thirty days, in which case the action of the Faculty shall not be final, till confirmed by the Board of Directors or Business Committee. The appeal shall be filed with the Scoretary of the Board, and shall be acted on by the Board or Business Committee, as soon as either can be called together. But whenever the Faculty are satisfied that, owing to habitual idleness, profanity, or any other cause, the presence of a student in the University is unfavorable to its prosperity and the welfare of other students, they may suspend him or her privately, or require the parent or guardian to remove such student immediately from the Institution. In all cases of suspension or expulsion, the delinquent shall forfeit the tuition fee, for the remainder of the term.

SEC. 23. The Faculty may, from time to time, make such prudential regulations pertaining to the social intercourse of the sexes, as they may deem expedient.

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CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

MATHESIAN SOCIETY.

PREAMBLE.

We, the undersigned, desirous of mutual improvement in Elocution, Composition, and Debate, do hereby form ourselves into a literary association, and adopt for our government the following Constitution and By-laws, to which we pledge unreserved fidelity:

CONSTITUTION:

ARTICLE I.

NAME.

This Association shall be known as the "Mathesian Society" of the N. W. C. University.

FARTICLE II.

MEMBERS.

SEC. 1. The members of the "Mathesian Society" shall be Active and Honorary.

SEC. 2. Any student of the N. W. C. University may become an active member, by signing the Constitution and paying his or her initiation fee, after his or her petition has been adopted.

SEC. 3. The initiation fee shall be Three Dollars.

SEC. 4. Any person, who is distinguished for application to, or proficiency in literature, may become an honorary member by

receiving three-fourths of all the votes cast at any regular meeting. Szc. 5. Honorary members shall be entitled to all the privileges of active members, except voting and holding office.

ARTICLE III.

OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, two Critics, Librarian, and Marshall.

ARTICLE IV.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

SEC. 1. The President shall preside over all meetings of the Society, call special meetings, present for consideration all motions regularly made, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, enforce a due observance of the Constitution and By-laws, and perform such other duties as his office may require.

SEC. 2. The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in his absence.

SEC. 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Society, have charge of its papers and records, and furnish each member with a list of class exercises, within ten days after each election.

SEC. 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall transact all correspondence, read anonymous productions, and perform the duties of the Recording Secretary in his absence.

SEC. 5. The Treasurer shall collect all moneys due the Society; keep an account of fines, receipts, and expenditures; make no payment without a written order from the President, countersigned by the Recording Secretary; and present a report to the Society at the expiration of his term of office.

SEC. 6. The Critics shall criticize all regular performances, and make such suggestions as they may deem necessary.

SEC 7. The Librarian shall take charge of the library, and make such disposition of the same as the Society may direct.

SEC. 8. The Marshall shall prepare the Hall for the reception of the Society, and assist the President in maintaining order.

SEC. 9. The President, Vice President, and Recording Secretary shall constitute a committee of arrangements for appointing exercises.

ARTICLE V.

ELECTIONS.

At the second regular meeting in each collegiate year there shall be an election of officers, and every three months thereafter.

ARTICLE VI.

VOTING.

All voting shall be "viva voce," except for receiving or expelling members, and electing officers.

Amendments to this Constitution shall be presented in writing, one week previous to being acted upon, and shall require the votes of three-fourths of the members present for their adoption.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

MEETINGS.

SEC. 1. This Society shall hold its regular meetings on Friday evening of each week.

SEC. 2. Seven members shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. S. The President shall call the House to order at 6.30 P. M., from October 22d to March 22d, and at 7.30 P. M., from March 22d to October 22d.

ARTICLE III.

FINES.

The President may impose the following fines: For late attendance, non-performance of duty, and leaving the hall without permission of the President, each ten (10) cents; for absence and disorderly conduct, each twenty-five (25) cents; for refusing to obser the President, fifty (50) cents.

ARTICLE IV.

APPEALS.

Any member may appeal from the decision of the Chair, on fines or points of order.

ARTICLE V.

EXPULSION.

SEC. 1. Any member who shall refuse to comply with the Constitution and By-laws, or be guilty of repeated disorderly conduct, shall be liable to suspension or expulsion.

SEC. 2. A motion to suspend or expel shall be made one week previous to being acted upon, that the accused may have an opportunity of defense, and it shall require a three-fourths vote for its adoption.

SEC. 3. Any member thus expelled shall not be again proposed for membership within one year.

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ARTICLE VI.

STUDENTS.

Students of the N. W. C. University, who are not members of this Society, shall not be admitted at regular meetings.

ARTICLE VII.

The motto of this Society shall be, Krnua es ası, esti madnese.

ARTICLE VIII.

AMENDMENTS.

Amendments to these By-laws shall lie on the table one week before being acted upon, and shall require a three-fourths vote for their adoption. 30
