## CHANGING FASHIONS IN NAMES FOR BOYS

This article on the changing popularity of male names since 1880 is based on Popular Baby Names, the Social Security Administration database described in the preceding article. Details on the layout of the following table can be found there. In general, male names are far less subject to fashion than female names, often persisting for decades. The briefest period of popularity was that of Jason, which at 13 years was almost as short as that of Brittany and Alexis. William reached a minimum rank of 20 in 1992 and has since enjoyed a small renaissance.

This is an update and expansion of an earlier study, "Changing Male Fashions 1870-1950", which appeared in the Nov 1999 issue of Word Ways. A reprint of a talk given to the 23rd Annual Names Institute in May 1984, the earlier study was based on a sample of a few thousand names drawn from Who's Who in America.
