# **TENSE HOMOPHONES**

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Homophones are words which sound the same but which have different spellings and different meanings. BAWL and BALL are homophones.

Here, I look at homophones in conjunction with past and present tenses. Consider the past tense PLACED and its present tense PLACE. Replacing PLACE with PLAICE (homophones) makes PLACED PLAICE, a meaningful designation (see A. below). Similarly, consider the present tense SURF and its past tense SURFED. Replacing SURF with SERF (homophones) makes SERF SURFED, another meaningful designation (see B. below).

*In both A. and B. it is the PRESENT tense which is replaced.*

# C. present tense is followed by a homophone of the past tense

As in the case of A. and B., some of the word pairs in C. above can be reversed to qualify for D. below eg. eat eight/eight eat.

## D. present tense is preceded by a homophone of the past tense

blue blow (caused bruising) bold bowl chaste chase (he didn't catch her!)

court catch crude crew eight eat flue fly (in the chimney)

fort fight herd hear one win pride (lions) pry

road ride rows rise (to applaud) side sigh (after losing the match)

war wear

#### In E, both the PAST AND PRESENT tenses are replaced:

## E.a homophone of the present tense is either preceded, or followed, by a homophone of the past tense

cited site herd here sea scene peke peaked (at dog show)

(sighted sight) (heard hear) (see seen) (peek peeked)

Finally, an example in which the past and present tenses are the same:

red reed (read read)

Darryl searched for two examples for every state and succeeded in finding 89 out of the possible 100 transposals for county name plus two-letter state abbreviation.
