KICKSHAWS by Dave Morice

Highly Structured Verse The first stanza of "Spiral Nebula" contains a foundation of 32 words upon which all other stanzas are built. The second stanza is constructed by taking the first word of the first stanza, then the last word of the first stanza, then the second word, then the second last word, and so on, concluding with the middle two words. The third stanza is formed by repeating the process with the second stanza. In the same fashion, the fourth, fifth, and sixth stanzas are made. If this process is applied to the sixth stanza, the result is the first stanza. The poem is a kind of nebula of words that spirals in on itself a la M.C. Escher.

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Perfect Number Names in Neo-Alphabets FOUR HUNDRED FIFTY THREE appears to be the highest. The end-of-the-alphabet values of one neo-alphabet generating it are ...YINFTDHUERO with values Y = 16, I = 17, ..., O = 26. To sum it up: 19+26+23+25 + 22+23+18+21+25+24+21 + 19+17+19+20+16 + 20+22+25+24+24 = 453. Other neo-alphabets with this solution can be formed by simply switching positions of letters that appear the same number of times in the number words. OINY can exchange places; UHDT can; FRE can. Altogether, there are 3,456 neo-alphabets whose letters can be placed at the end of the alphabet with no gaps.

There are probably no multiplicative examples other than SIX or TEN.

She wrote that she'd just returned from the West with several boxes of new acquisitions packed in her station wagon. At the Saudi border, the four copies of "St. Alphabet" that she'd brought were confiscated by guards who thought they were Christian religious books because of the "St." in the title.
