## **AVIAN TAUTONYMS**

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In my "AEIOU Words in Biology" in the February 1994 Word Ways, I conjectured that the Boat-billed Heron, Cochlearius cochlearius cochlearius, was possibly unique in having the five vowels once in each of its genus, species and subspecies names. Since then I have discovered a further 51 genus/species/subspecies trinomial tautonyms from the world of birds. My source was A Complete Checklist of the Birds of the World by Richard Howard and Alick Moore. In the list below, names marked with an asterisk appeared in a list of fourteen trinomial tautonyms in Ed Wolpow's "Triple Tautonyms in Biology" May 1983.

So far, all the tautonymic names have consisted of two or three separate words. But what about single-word tautonyms? A small number can be found amongst the English common names of birds, though the word 'common' is somewhat of a misnomer as some of these are not at all familiar. They are the Boubou, Bulbul, Caracara, Kaka, Motmot, Huet-huet, Brubru Shrike, Borabora Kingfisher, Tawitawi Bleeding Heart, Gang-gang Cockatoo, Niamniam Parrot, Tink-tink Cisticola and Kauai O-o! Indeed, the See See Partridge was the only tautonymic common bird name I found which wasn't a single word. Aiaiai, the popular name for the Roseate Spoonbill, may be unique amongst bird names in being a single-word triple. It can be found below the line in Webster's Second Edition.

A few single-word tautonyms are also to be found amongst the thousands of genus, species and subspecies bird names although Turtur, a genus of Wood Doves, was the only such genus in my checklist.
