The initials of the fifty individuals are the US postal codes for the 50 states: Carol Angelus = California, Mac Aroni = Massachusetts, etc.

Two Sonnet Anagram Puzzles by Mike Keith

Ms. Lowell's poem contains exactly 140 vowels (including Y). This means that the anagram sonnet must use an average of one vowel per syllable (in fact, each syllable uses exactly one). This is well below the average, since a typical English sonnet uses about 185 vowels, or roughly 1.3 vowels per syllable.

The R.L. Stevenson letter has 280 vowels, demanding a sonnet with an average of 2.0 vowels per syllable, even farther from the norm. This does not mean that every syllable needs to have two vowels (though most do). A few three-vowel syllables were employed to sneak in a few single-vowel ones, such as the words "cash" and "part".

Since there are words with more than two vowels per syllable, as well as words with fewer than one (e.g., "mightn't"), it's not true that 1.0 and 2.0 syllables per vowel are the maximum—but they almost are.

In non-fiction articles, the responsibility for the accuracy of any statement rests primarily with the author. The general scope of any investigation should be defined: for example, a statement that words have been taken from the *Merriam-Webster Collegiate Dictionary* or the *Merriam-Webster Unabridged Dictionary*, *Third Edition.*, or place names taken from the *Times Index-Gazetteer of the World*. If a word or name comes from an unusual source, this should be identified. Footnotes in general should be avoided; references can be given either in the text or at the end of the article.

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
