

## ANAGRAMMATICAL CLUSTERS

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The six distinct letters E, I, M, R, S, and T can be permuted to form a set of four words with different initial letters – MITERS, TIMERS, SMITER, and REMITS – which we'll call a *6-4 anagrammatical cluster*. Definitions are provided below for common words that form a dozen anagrammatical clusters whose sizes have been indicated in parentheses. How many can you discover?
